Partnerships and collaborations! Miami Township is leading the way for running government differently. To save our residents money and begin the process to reduce property taxes, we have established several agreements with our neighboring jurisdictions. Miamisburg, Springboro, Dayton, Montgomery County and the Miamisburg City School District are all our willing partners.

Our first collaboration was with the city of Miamisburg in the creation of the Hillgrove Cemetery District. We share in the cost of running the cemetery, and now with the construction of a columbarium, the cemetery will be practically self-sufficient.

Next was the formation of the Miami Valley Fire District, once again with Miamisburg. We are currently running on 2006 budget levels and have saved our taxpayers more than \$1 million over the last five years.

The rest of the partnerships are with the Joint Economic Development Districts, in which we have three. These allow us to pay the debt service of construction on several projects and afford the township the ability to attract new businesses such as FedEx and Huff Corporation, to name just a few. While some have questioned the need for the JEDDs, the taxpayers will begin to see the benefits as these agreements mature.

We have great staff working for our community and a strategic plan put into place with the input from many residents, all with the intent to increase service levels while lowering our property taxes. We have accomplished a great deal over the past four years, and I look forward to continuing to serve our residents.

Know Your Neighbors

Ron and Cherry Bingamon are 40-year residents of Chautauqua. They are a living encyclopedia of its history. They raised two children there, and now regularly welcome their four grandchildren.

"Chautauqua is truly a wonderful place to live and raise children. We treasure our memories as homeowners here," Cherry said.



Chautauqua dates to 1901 in Miami Township. Families would spend their entire summers taking advantage of a grand hotel, summer cottages, swimming pool, skating rink and many other amenities. First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt visited in July 1940 to speak to a crowd of 4,000 people. She stayed in the house next door to where the Bingamons currently live, and greeted residents in the couple's front yard.

"We weren't there, of course, but we have the photo to show it off," Cherry said.

Chautauqua was a private community until 1987 when its association voted to become part of Miami Township for better management of roads and property. Many of houses in the community were handed down through generations of families. The Bingamons will never forget a summer in the 1970s when their son's holiday invitation caused quite a bang.

"He and a friend told the neighbors they were planning a big fireworks display," Cherry said. "All they had was a hammer and some caps."

Both Ron and Cherry are retired educators. Ron's paintings of the grandchildren dress the walls of their home, and there is an easily recognizable theme in the kitchen. There are cherries everywhere; plates, linens, you name it, all very fitting for a woman named *Cherry* Bingamon. 🏡

The Miami Township Veterans Memorial is celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2018. A special celebration on July 28 will commemorate the milestone while remembering those veterans who bravely served our country.

The Community Foundation of Miami Township (CFMT) is organizing and helping fund the event. Guests can expect a veterans' walk to the site, a bench dedication to the Fraternal Order of Eagles Post 2306 in Miamisburg, a full color guard and light refreshments. 2018 Pavement Maintenance Program

The Miami Township Road Department is preparing roadways for the 2018 Pavement Maintenance Program. The cost for preventative maintenance treatments is up nearly 30 percent from 2016, so the township is testing a new, lower-cost alternative called micro-surfacing. **All residents of streets scheduled for resurfacing will receive prior notification regarding temporary lane closures or parking restrictions.**

Three streets will be resurfaced using micro-surfacing: Cobblegate Drive, Mays Avenue and Orchard Park Run Road.

Three street sections will be included in the Montgomery County Engineer's Office asphalt resurfacing bid. They are: Byers Road north of Lyons Road to the jurisdictional line; Kingsridge Drive north of SR 725 to Washington Park Drive; and the Spring Valley Pike intersection east of SR 741.

One roadway section will be re-paved using asphalt through the MVRPC/ODOT resurfacing grant. Washington Church Road from the Spring Valley Pike intersection, south about one half mile, will be resurfaced through ODOT in the spring/summer of 2018.

What is micro-surfacing?

Micro-surfacing is designed to preserve asphalt, improve skid resistance and provide a better weather-tight barrier. It is fast-setting, durable and low cost. The newly laid surface will be slightly coarser than asphalt, but it will smooth out over time. The township will be tracking its durability and long-term wear in consideration of future use.

Crack Seal Program

The Road Department is continuing its crack sealing program. All streets are evaluated yearly and selections are made based on pavement conditions. The preventative maintenance program extends the life of asphalt pavement and keeps damaging moisture from penetrating the road surface. Crews also prepare road surfaces with crack sealant prior to resurfacing township streets. Since the program's inception in 2007, road crews have sealed more than 30 percent of township roadways. 🏠

Drains, Ditches and Watercourses Information

The responsibility for the maintenance and improvement of drains, streams, ditches and watercourses, whether established county/township ditches or not, rests entirely upon the land owners affected and benefited. It is not the obligation of the county/township to maintain or improve the storm drainage facilities across any individual's property for either agricultural purposes or development of suburban home sites. When an individual purchases property, the principal of "caveat emptor" or "let the buyer beware," is the purchaser's best guideline. Land ownership has many potential and real benefits, but also comes with certain liabilities. Storm drainage facilities fall under the liability category of property ownership. These storm drainage facilities cannot be closed, obstructed or altered in any way which would reduce the capacity for conveying storm water across private property. Any owner is liable for upstream property damage for failure to properly maintain storm drainage facilities across his own property. *From Montgomery County Engineer pamphlet, "Responsibility and Procedure for Improvement and Maintenance of Drains, Ditches and Watercourses."*

Discharging water from downspouts and basement sump pumps onto the roadway is not permitted by Miami Township. Dumping excess water can create a public safety hazard and prematurely deteriorate the road surface and curb. Right-of-Way Permit Information

Don't forget to contact the Road Department before starting any home improvement projects within the road right-of-way.

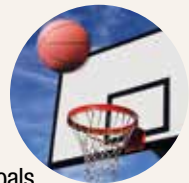


The right-of-way is typically the strip of turf roughly ten feet from the curb line. Projects that include curb, driveway apron and sidewalk replacement require a permit and inspection before work can begin. Large landscape plantings and irrigation systems should be placed out of the right-of-way to avoid view obstructions and eliminate potential damage to vehicles and underground/overhead utilities. Permits and construction requirements can be obtained at the Public Works Department located at 10891 Wood Road. 🏠

Basketball Hoop Policy

Miami Township reminds residents to remove all permanent or portable basketball hoops from the right-of-way.

Two township snow plow trucks were damaged while clearing snow this past winter after striking illegally placed basketball goals. Repairs totaled more than \$8,000. Property owners are liable for damages caused by illegally placed items. The township is obligated to keep the road rights-of-way clear of obstructions, including taking necessary steps to address violations. 🏠

Public Works

Leaf Collection Program begins November 5

The Road Department will provide leaf collection services to township residents beginning November 5, 2018. **Please have all leaves curbside by November 26 to ensure leaves are collected regardless of the actual day crews arrive on your street.** Crews will begin the final round on November 26 in the Huber plat and work north to south completing all roadways. The street sweeper will not be incorporated into the collection program. Once leaf collection concludes, crews will concentrate on debris removal in storm water basins and will convert vehicles for winter weather operations. Please contact Rumpke **(800) 828-8171** for questions regarding disposal of leaves after the township program is complete.

During the heaviest stage of leaf fall or times of inclement weather, it is not uncommon to have long periods between rounds. The department may adjust to a six day and/or 10 hours per day work schedule to accelerate the collection process. Residents are encouraged to mulch leaves during the fall to supply turf with nutrients necessary for a healthy lawn. Mulching can be accomplished by raising the deck of the lawnmower and installing a blade designed for this activity. It is a free way to naturally fertilize your yard. Composting leaves also creates natural fertilizer for plants and lawns.

To help maximize efficiencies in the collection program, residents are urged to:

- ✦ Mulch or rake leaves often.
- ✦ Place leaf piles near the curb or roadway edge, but not in the roadway. Leaves placed in the roadway create a safety hazard for motorists and a potential liability to the responsible individual.
- ✦ Do not place leaves directly in front of or directly into storm water inlets. Leaves blocking the inlets prohibit proper roadway drainage and may clog drainage tiles.
- ✦ Avoid parking vehicles on leaves. This is an extreme safety hazard. Crews record all obstacles which hinder collection.
- ✦ Avoid mixing grass clippings, sticks and other debris in with leaves. Crews will not pick up leaf piles containing these items.

Yard Waste

As spring turns to summer, many homeowners are preparing their yards for the growing season. Before a garden can grow, there is work to be done. Downed tree limbs need disposal, bushes need cutting back, leaves might need raking out of tight corners on the property. Then, there is the question of how to dispose of it all.



Rumpke Waste and Recycling picks up any yard waste right along with the trash on your regularly scheduled trash pick-up day. Leaves and clippings can be put in biodegradable bags (no plastic) and placed in with the trash at the curbside. Brush and limbs must be tied into bundles no larger than four feet long and two feet wide.

Remember to check for your specific trash pick-up day, and have your yard waste and trash to the curb by 6 a.m. Should you have any other questions, call Rumpke at **937-461-0004** or **1-800-828-8171**, or visit www.Rumpke.com. 🌱

Permit Information

Are you building a shed, pool or fence this spring?

Don't forget to secure a permit through the Miami Township Community Development Department. Permits must be obtained for all pools and any shed that is larger than 100 square feet. All fencing, including replacement of existing fencing, must be approved.

Tall Grass

As we transition from winter to spring, please be aware of your property's maintenance. Our zoning inspectors are working throughout the spring and summer months to deal with many code violations, but excessively tall grass and weeds are all too common this time of year. The Miami Township Property Maintenance Code allows a maximum of eight inches in height for grass and weeds. If your property exceeds this maximum, a zoning inspector will attempt to talk to you about the situation before issuing a violation on the property.

Our goal is to have every property well maintained and in compliance with this standard. Please reach out to one of our zoning inspectors if you are leaving for an extended period of time or are unable to keep your land maintained, and they will work with you to the best of their ability. If a property owner does not maintain their property to these requirements, a violation will be issued, and the premises could be declared a nuisance.

The nuisance process allows the township to hire a contractor to mow and maintain the property and assess the cost of this service to the property taxes. Why not hold your graduation party, baby shower, family reunion or birthday celebration outdoors in one of our beautiful parks? Miami Township offers 10 parks to explore free of charge.

Five parks have shelters available by reservation. To reserve a shelter, call us at **937-433-9969** or visit our website at www.miamitownship.com.

- ★ **Crains Run** – *located west of Cincinnati Pike and south of Crains Run Road* – has two shelters with picnic tables available for reservation, playground equipment, a biking/hiking trail, woods, port-o-johns and a fishing pond. A fishing license is not required. No fee.
- ★ **Layer** – *located at 4999 Cordell Drive in the Huber subdivision*, has a shelter with picnic tables, grills, playground equipment, baseball diamond and two half basketball courts, along with 15 parking spaces. There is a \$10 cash deposit required to reserve this park, you will receive a key for the restrooms. When you return the key to the Miami Township office, within five days from your event, your \$10 will be refunded. **(Re-opens in summer 2018 – call 937-433-9969 to check availability)**
- ★ **Miami View** – *located on the west side of Munger Road south of Alex Bell Road* – has a shelter with restroom facility, picnic tables, three softball/baseball diamonds, playground equipment and a fishing pond. There is a \$10 cash deposit required to reserve this park; you will receive a key for the restrooms. When you return the key to the Miami Township office, within five days from your event, your \$10 will be refunded.
- ★ **Omietsk** – *located at 9797 Nettleton Park in the Villages of Miami subdivision* – has a shelter available for reservations and playground equipment in a wooded setting, and six parking spaces. No restroom or port-o-john available. No fee.
- ★ **Waldruhe** – *located on the east side of SR 741 across from Austin Landing* – has two shelters with picnic tables, hiking trails, playground equipment and a port-o-john. No fee.

Layer Park

The township is celebrating Layer Park's grand re-opening this summer, and it will have all the amenities one expects of a neighborhood park. Nestled in the Huber subdivision off Cordell Drive, visitors can shoot hoops on two basketball half-courts, throw a party at the refurbished shelter, cook hot dogs on new grills, or just enjoy the view that includes 60 new native trees. Children can look forward to playing on new play equipment, and there are plenty of parking spaces in the newly paved parking lot.

Layer Park closed in 2016 after high levels of arsenic and lead were found in the soil. The United States Environmental Protection Agency was brought in to strip away and replace tons of soil and dozens of trees to help return the park to its original beauty. The source of the contamination was traced to an old skeet shooting range on the site nearly 90 years ago.
