## President's Report

As 2019 winds down, Miami Township is ready to build on our success as

we stand ready for the winter season. Our Public Works Department is on the front lines, clearing leaves from residents' properties and preparing to battle the winter elements to keep our roadways clear of snow and ice.

We completed much needed upgrades to Crains Run Road and reduced the speed limit there at the request of concerned citizens. Our Parks and Recreation staff completed many upgrades to our parks including new safety features and sports equipment.

Our Community Development Department is undertaking the creation of a new comprehensive plan that will help set the course for our township. With your input, the township can work to develop properties that trigger economic growth and put forth resources for recreational projects that bring us together as a community.

To keep our community strong, it is also important that we support the Miamisburg City Schools' renewal substitute emergency levy on Election Day, November 5. The \$7.225 million generated annually with no added tax burden on our residents, will provide students, many of whom live in the township, with the same top-quality education that the Miamisburg community has come to expect. Qualified teachers will be able to utilize instructional materials and supplies that set students along a path to success. Extra-curricular activities and academic programs can remain strong and enrich students' school experiences.

In addition, the West Carrollton School District is asking voters to approve a 5.7 mill bond issue to help build four new school buildings. With the bulk of the cost paid by the state of Ohio, the funds collected

## The Plan: Be a Part of the Township's Vision



Miami Township is updating its comprehensive plan for the township. This vision for our community will serve as a blueprint for the land use decisions that will shape the development and growth of our township in the future.

This process is interactive and succeeds when the community is involved. The Community Development Department will be holding public meetings over the next year where your attendance is requested.

There will be several large-scale public meetings, the first being in December 2019. At this meeting, the discussion will focus on the vision of the township, the framework for the plan, and the gathering of ideas and opinions. Additional public meetings will be held over the next year. As the timeline for these meetings is finalized, they will be disseminated through the township website, social media, and through newspaper outlets.

The Community Development Department will also have neighborhood and stakeholder meetings where they go into a neighborhood, place of worship, or business and meet with a specific group to talk about the plan. All these meetings will be held between October 2019 and May of 2020. This general timeline is expected to culminate with a draft plan presented to the Board of Trustees in the summer of 2020 and the adoption of a final plan in the fall/winter of 2020.

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Vice President's Report

As we approach the end of 2019 and the start of 2020 (can you believe the century is 20% done already?), I want to extend a quick thank you to those residents who have taken time to call, text or email the trustees regarding issues in the township. It is so exciting that some residents still write and mail in letters! I believe all the trustees want to stay informed and these types of communication are part of how that happens.

Another great way to help the trustees better understand your individual concerns or to inform us about community issues or events is to come to a Board of Trustees meeting and speak during the public comments part of the meeting. Your thoughts are taken into public record, recorded in the minutes and broadcast through our posting of meeting transcripts (written and video) online. While it is an easy process and everyone is welcome to offer public comments during trustee meetings, we realize that most people have never been to a meeting. I thought it may be helpful to share details on how a trustee meeting works.

The Miami Township Board of Trustees meets twice each month, on the second and fourth Tuesdays at 6 p.m. at the Government Center, 2700 Lyons Road, behind the fire house. Every meeting has an agenda which is posted online in advance of the meeting. Some meetings have a lot of items to discuss, others are very short. Regardless, each meeting makes time for public comments, most often at the start of the meeting. All content must be submitted to video services 72 hours prior to tipoff. On a table outside the room, you will see copies of the agenda and a stack of comment cards for those who wish to address the board. This gives us a record of how to contact you should you request information or a response to a concern. Present the card to the fiscal officer and when the public comments begin, you will be called forward to share your thoughts. Census 2020



The 2020 Census will count every person in every U.S. state and five U.S. territories beginning January 1, 2020. It is required by law and provides crucial data that helps decide how federal funding is distributed for schools, roads, fire departments and other resources that affect our day-to-day lives.

Miami Township residents will begin seeing an influx of information regarding the census beginning January 1, 2020. You should receive an invitation via a mailed postcard to participate by Census Day on April 1. Anyone who does not fill out a census form can expect a knock on the door in late April and May.

The U.S. Census Bureau is making it easy to respond. You can participate by phone, by mail, and new in 2020, online! You'll be able to sit at your computer desktop or grab your mobile device to fill out the official census form.

2020 Dog Tags Available

Keep your puppers and doggos safe by licensing them—it's the law. For your convenience, dog tags will be available for purchase at the Miami Township Government Center, 2700 Lyons Rd, from December 2, 2019 through January 31, 2020.

Fees this year remain the same: \$20 per license (\$24 for unaltered dogs). This enables the dog owner to avoid a potential \$150 ticket for failure to license their pet. There is a \$20 late fee for owners who fail to license their dog before the January 31 deadline.

The Miami Township Government Center is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The license fee is payable to Miami Township by cash or check. **No credit or debit cards are accepted.**

All license fees generated go to support the work of the Animal Resource Center for the rescue, care, and housing of our community's lost and homeless pets.

Healthcare Info



Ohio policy makers have an ongoing debate over so-called surprise billing when you are at an 'in-network' facility, but a caregiver there is out of your policy network. In Miami Township alone, there are a multitude of choices when making health care decisions like retail health clinics, private doctors' offices, urgent cares, emergency centers and hospital emergency rooms.

On average, while an online medical appointment may cost around \$49, a retail clinic jumps to \$72, a doctor's office \$124, urgent care \$143, and a visit to the emergency center or hospital \$1,404 (source: *Anthem Blue Cross/Blue Shield: rates are national averages based on total cost of care. Actual costs vary.*)

Always be sure to make an informed decision while choosing which medical facility is right for you. Learn in advance who takes your insurance and how much it will end up costing you. Meet with your chosen health care provider to answer any questions before you commit to treatment.

## Miami Valley Fire District – Holiday Tips

The Miami Valley Fire District would like everyone to have a safe, enjoyable and stress-free holiday season. The winter holidays are a time for family gatherings and celebrations. The many parties, dinners and events increase the risk of fire related emergencies. More than 500 fires occur nationwide during the Christmas holiday week due to the ignition of Christmas trees. An estimated \$11 million in property loss occurs, not to mention the emotional distraught experienced by family members. The following safety tips are designed to keep your holiday celebrations safe:

### SAFETY TIPS:

- Take care when burning candles. Be sure that all candles are kept away from decorations and other combustible materials. Make sure candles are out before going to bed.
- Decorate only with flame retardant or non-combustible materials. Choose a fresh Christmas tree and water it regularly.
- Do not leave children unattended in a room with lit candles. Always keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children.
- Use a Christmas tree stand specifically designed to prevent tip over.
- Do not display lighted candles in windows or near exits in case of the need to escape from the home.
- Place your Christmas tree well away from heat sources and exits.
- Never use candles to decorate Christmas trees.
- When using extension cords, do not run them under rugs, carpets, furniture or across doorways.
- Use only Underwriters Laboratory (UL) approved Christmas lights when decorating.
- Make sure extension cords used out doors are intended for outdoor use.
- Do not overload electrical outlets and always unplug the lights before leaving home or going to bed.
- Unplug and do not use any extension cord that is hot to the touch.
- Never put electrical lights on a metal Christmas tree.
- Do not use any extension cord that has frayed/exposed wiring or a loose/broken plug.
- When installing outside lights with a ladder, make sure it is properly footed and attended by another individual.
- Check smoke detectors regularly to assure they are in working order.



Please utilize these safety tips and apply them to your home this holiday season to help keep it safe and fire free. ## Roadside Right-of-Way Tree Trimming

Public Works' winter maintenance program kicks in after January 1, 2020. Crews will begin to trim roadside branches to help maintain a clear view for motorists. Areas scheduled for trimming include: Villages of Miami; Heritage Glen; Chimney Springs; Country Walk; Chautauqua; and various rural roads.

Residents in these platted areas will be notified in November. Work crews are not professional arborists. If you desire a more aesthetic look, be sure to trim the branches before January 1, 2020. Trimming guidelines can be found on our website under Public Works. Call the Road Department at 937-866-4661 before January 1 if you elect to trim your trees and want our staff to bypass your property.

## Sports Equipment Rules of the Game

Miami Township reminds residents to remove all permanent or portable basketball goals and other athletic/recreational equipment from the road right-of-way. Informational door hangers have been distributed to the 115+ properties in violation of this Ohio law. While most property owners voluntarily move the basketball goals out of the right-of-way, Notice of Violation letters have been mailed to the remaining properties in violation. Miami Township understands some of these goals are in cul-de-sacs and on low traffic volume streets, but the law must be enforced on all public roadways. ## November 4 – Leaf Collection Program Begins

Time to rake the leaves! The Road Department will provide leaf collection services to township residents beginning the week of November 4. The final round of pickup begins November 25, so be sure to have your leaves curbside by November 25 to ensure they are collected. Crews begin each round in the Huber subdivision and work north to south until all roadways are complete.

During the heaviest stage of falling leaves or due to inclement weather, it is possible to have lengthy time periods between rounds. Crews may adjust to a 6-day work schedule should that occur. Miami Township may not be able to collect all leaves. Certain tree species may not shed their leaves until late fall or early winter. Please contact Rumpke at 800-828-8171 for questions regarding proper disposal of leaves after the township program ends.



### TO MAKE THE LEAF PROGRAM A SUCCESS:

- Rake leaves often.
- Consider mulching and composting as a free and natural way to fertilize your yard.
- Place leaf piles at the back of the curb, NOT IN THE ROADWAY. It can cause a safety hazard and pickup delays due to piles becoming compacted by precipitation and cars driving and parking on the leaves.
- Do not place leaves in front of or directly into storm water inlets. Leaves blocking inlets prohibit proper roadway drainage and may clog drainage tiles. Drainage tiles on private property (beyond right-of-way) and driveway culverts are the responsibility of the property owner for clearing obstructions.
- Do not place leaves directly in roadside ditches and open waterways.
- Avoid parking vehicles on or near leaf piles. It can create a potential fire hazard.
- Township crews do not pick up bagged leaves placed curbside.
- Properly bag leaves for collection by Rumpke on your scheduled collection day.
- Avoid mixing grass clippings, sticks and other debris in with the leaves. Crews will not pick up leaf piles with limbs mixed in with the leaves. It can damage equipment and delay collection.

## Winter Snow and Ice Removal

The Road Department provides residents and businesses with snow removal on township-maintained streets. Crews run nine separate routes to help keep residents safe while driving on wintry roads.

Rock salt treatment alone takes crews about 4 hours to complete a route while plowing and salting takes at least 10 hours to complete a route.

Weather conditions and traffic patterns can add a lot of time to snow removal. To ensure fiscal responsibility and maintain motorist safety, township staff may adjust routes so that heavily traveled streets are treated first, followed by streets with steep grades and busy intersections. During prolonged weather events, cul-de-sac circles will be partially cleared to permit traffic flow.

### HOW YOU CAN HELP



Residents are reminded to:

- Delay non-essential travel until roads are cleared.
- Do not attempt to pass township trucks while they are salting or plowing.
- Remove vehicles from streets to allow crews to plow the entire street during heavy snowfall.
- You are not permitted to push snow into the street when clearing a driveway. It causes a safety hazard.
- To avoid clearing a driveway entrance repeatedly, wait until the snow stops and staff is finished plowing the entire roadway curb to curb.

### WHO MAINTAINS WHAT?

Not all roadways within Miami Township are maintained by our crews. Many roads are maintained by other governmental agencies or private contractors:

- The Ohio Department of Transportation, 937-832-1824, maintains all state routes.
- The Montgomery County Engineer's Office, 937-837-2528, maintains county routes.
- Complex owners maintain condo/apartment complexes and mobile home park streets.
- Newly constructed streets (not formally accepted by the township) and private roadways are maintained by the property developer or by a homeowner's association.
- Austin Landing is maintained by the property's developer.

### Park Renovations Add Fun and Safety

Miami Township parks are all spruced up and ready for families to enjoy this fall. The Parks and Recreation Department spent all summer completing various projects. Every park now has a swing set, complete with seating for both toddlers and adults. There is also new 'fall zone' mulch and edging to help soften the blow should a child take a tumble. New play equipment was installed at the Chautauqua 8th Street Park and a new asphalt path was added at Layer Park. Several new park signs were installed and the utility house at Waldruhe Park got a fresh coat of paint.

"Every project helps us become ADA compliant (Americans with Disabilities Act) and really gives each park a fresh, new look," Park Supervisor Rex Gore said. "I think residents will really notice a difference when they visit."

There is still work to be done. New backstops will be installed for each ball diamond at Miami View Park, while the ball diamond at Layer Park will be renovated and a new backstop and benches installed.

"All of our ball diamonds will be ready for baseball season in the spring," Gore said.

### Vote - School Districts Ask for Your Vote

Two school districts that serve Miami Township are asking voters for their support on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2019. The West Carrollton School District has a 5.7 mill bond issue on the ballot that would help build four new school buildings within the district.



A state study reveals that maintenance and updates of existing buildings outweigh the costs of new construction. If the plan moves ahead, a PK-Grade 1 school and a Grade 2-4 school would be constructed on the site of the current Walter Shade Early Childhood Center and middle school sites. A grades 5-6 building would be built at the C.F. Holliday site, and a grades 7-12 campus would be located at the Schnell Elementary and high school sites. The state would pick up 81% of costs while the district covers the rest. Read more at [www.westcarrolltonschools.com](http://www.westcarrolltonschools.com).



The Miamisburg City Schools are asking voters to renew its 5-year substitute emergency levy. This is a renewal levy request and does not increase current property taxes. It is a zero-tax increase 8.18 mill five-year levy most recently renewed by voters in 2014, expiring in 2020. The levy funds will maintain current programs within the district.
